# What is Surveillance?

... the ongoing, systematic collection, analysis, interpretation, and dissemination of data regarding a health-related event for use in public health action to reduce morbidity and mortality and to improve health.

Public health surveillance system data are used for:
immediate public health action,
program planning and evaluation, and
formulating research hypotheses


Three key aspects of a surveillance system:

data collection,

timely dissemination of findings, and
putting data to action



# **Behavioral Rick Factor Surveillance System**

% adults:

dental visit in the past year

number of lost permanent teeth

teeth cleaning within the past year

% dentate adults with diabetes with dental visit in past year

# **Pregnancy Risk Assessment and Monitoring System**

% pregnant women:

needed to see a dentist for a problem

had dental/health care worker speak gums & teeth care visited dentist or dental clinic

#### **Illinois State Cancer Registry**

oral and pharyngeal cancer death rate

% of oral and pharyngeal cancers detected at the earliest stages

% age 40+, oral and pharyngeal cancer exam in past 12 months

% children using preventive and restorative dental services # children enrolled:

Title XIX Medicaid for at least one month of the year Title XXI SCHIP for at least one month of the year % adults (18-65 & 65+years) with dental visits # dentists:

Medicaid providers at least one paid claim with paid claims > \$10,000



- Sources of financial support, stakeholders
- Survey / Email other departments, states and CDC to learn potential partners
- CDC guideline to evaluate the system data validity, integrity, completeness, timeliness

- Understanding the strengths and weaknesses of IOHSS
- Assure data validity
- Identify gaps
- Identify potential partners
- Plan for financial resources

# Implementation

- Does IOHSS have sufficient IT support, security check, solid surveillance plan and sustainability plan?
- Awareness of IOHSS among partners and stakeholders
- Identify new partners and stakeholders
- Use CDC guideline to evaluate the system
- Usefulness of IOHSS among key stakeholders and community

- Were people able to use the data collected
- Awareness of IOHSS
  - Find out our potential financial supporters
  - Are we satisfying our partners/stakeholders for data needs?
  - Help develop marketing strategies

#### **Maintenance**

- Evaluate the reach of the information, timeliness of the analysis and dissemination of the reports
- Evaluate the policy and legislative actions taken due to the system by tracking the environment
- Evaluate the sustainability of IOHSS

- Helps to understand the success of IOHSS
- Increases the system's efficiency
- Helps develop policies and legislative actions
- Can promote sustainability
