Answers to Questions

Indications

- On sound, at risk surfaces
- To arrest questionable non-cavitated carious lesions
 - Results show that caries may become inactive or arrested if adequately sealed.
 - Remember "iceberg of dental caries"
 - Use good judgment and be consistent

Answers to Questions

Detection

Visual (Sharp eyes and a blunt explorer)
No magnification required
No radiographs necessary
No need for other diagnostic tools (i.e. diagnodent) to avoid high number of "false positives"

- Tooth Preparation
 - Follow manufacture's recommendations?
