Sustainability In Oral Health Programs

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Sustainability

• Starts with the beginning of program development and as such, should not be conceived as a final phase of development.

'Routinization'

• Constitutes the primary process permitting the sustainability of programs within organizations and may lead to program-related organizational routines.

Standardization

- Constitutes the secondary process permitting the sustainability of programs.
- Institutional standards introduce a higher degree of program sustainability.
- Such standards are materialized by state-level rules and policies, and constrain organizational routines.

Concomitant

• The processes of implementation and sustainability are concomitant.

Influential Factors

- Certain specific events influence sustainability, and others, implementation.
- Others influence both implementation and sustainability, as joint events belonging to both processes.

Five Key Factors that influence Sustainability:

- State political and financial climate;
- Community awareness and capacity;
- State program structure and administration;
- Program funding stability and planning; and,
- Surveillance and evaluation.
