# Utilization of AAPHD HRSA dental public health curriculum

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### Background

• In 2010, the American Association of Public Health Dentistry was supported by a 5 year grant through Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) under grant number D83HP19949 Predoctoral Training in General, Pediatric, and Public Health Dentistry and Dental Hygiene, grant amount \$650,000.

### Goal

To develop and implement a model predoctoral core curriculum in dental public health for dental and dental hygiene students that will result in increased public health awareness, knowledge and skills of dental and hygiene students nationally.

### Objectives of the grant

- Objective I: Develop a set of core dental public health competencies for pre-doctoral dental and dental hygiene education.
- Objective II Develop a model dental public health curriculum based on the previously determined core competencies for pre-doctoral dental and dental hygiene students.
- Objective III Conduct pilot programs to test the curriculum at dental and dental hygiene schools.
- Objective IV Establish a Speaker's Bureau through AAPHD
  of instructors who can provide training on the model predoctoral dental public health curriculum to educational
  institutions throughout the United States.

# Objective 1 Eight Competencies

- 1. Incorporate ethical reasoning and actions in oral health care
- 2. Synthesize, critique, and apply information from scientific and lay sources to improve the public's oral health
- Describe social and health care systems and determinants of health and their impact on the oral health of the individual and population




# Final curriculum launched on aaphd webpage

### Purpose of this study
